

RESOLUTION NO. 09-184

A RESOLUTION OF THE CITY COMMISSION OF THE CITY OF KEY WEST, FLORIDA, RANKING FIVE (5) DISASTER RESPONSE SERVICE RESPONDERS AND AUTHORIZING STAFF TO NEGOTIATE FIVE (5) CONTRACTS FOR A TERM OF THREE YEARS (WITH A THREE YEAR OPTION; DIRECTING THE CITY MANAGER TO BRING THE CONTRACTS BACK TO THE COMMISSION FOR FINAL APPROVAL; PROVIDING FOR AN EFFECTIVE DATE

WHEREAS, the City issued RFP 09-007 for Disaster Response Service Responders, to which 15 firms responded; and

WHEREAS, City staff, at properly noticed public meetings, reviewed the proposals based upon specified criteria and ranked the fifteen firms responding.

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE CITY COMMISSION OF THE CITY OF KEY WEST, FLORIDA, AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1: That top ranked firms as determined in order by the Commission are:

1. Crowder Disaster Recovery
2. Crowder Gulf Joint Venture, Inc.
3. Omni Pinnacle, LLC.
4. AshBritt Environmental, Inc.
5. DRC Emergency Services, LLC.

Section 2: That City Staff is authorized to negotiate five

contracts, starting with the topped ranked firm, for a term of three years, with a three year option. The City Manager is directed to bring the contracts before the City Commission for consideration.

Section 3: That this Resolution shall go into effect immediately upon its passage and adoption and authentication by the signature of the presiding officer and the Clerk of the Commission.

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

SUBJECT: Staff Review of RFP #09-007 Disaster Response Service Responder Proposals

ACTION STATEMENT: A Resolution accepting staff's short listing of five (5) Disaster Response Service Responders and ranking the firms 1 through 5. Staff is directed to negotiate contracts with the top 3 firms. Should the parties be unable to reach agreement staff will negotiate with the next firm.

STRATEGIC PLAN:

Storm Event planning has been identified as a major priority in the Environment Management section of the Strategic Plan.

CITIZEN BENEFIT:

Maintaining contracts with multiple debris management and hauling firms, ensure that the City has adequate resources to respond to and recover from storm events. Selection of companies with debris management experience helps to ensure good business practices and record keeping, which are in line with FEMA and State guidelines for reimbursement, saving taxpayer's money.

BACKGROUND:

The City was impacted by one Tropical Storm and three Hurricanes during the 2008 storm season. Although three of the events were ineligible for FEMA or State reimbursement, each resulted in minor to moderate damage from wind and moderate damage from flooding. Flood damage was confined to the south side of the island; Smather's Beach and Atlantic Blvd.

Grubbs Emergency Services LLC has been the City's debris removal contractor since Hurricane Georges in 1998 and is under contract with the City until July of 2009. This contract was awarded as an emergency and was not competitively bid.

The intent of RFP #09-007 Disaster Response Services (RFP 09-007) is to rank, negotiate and eventually award contracts to multiple companies in the event that a debris contractor is unable to satisfactorily address the City's needs. After conversations with several solid waste administrators in other county and municipal governments, this is a highly recommended approach. This would also assure that if the

second or third contractor were needed, the City has awarded the contract through a formal bidding process, which is preferred by FEMA for reimbursement over “piggy-back” or “emergency” awards.

The “Request For Proposal” was comprehensive in description, all the critical information relevant to this type of work was requested by the City. It included a model storm of 200,000 cubic yards of debris and facilities support for the City’s response staff.

This model “storm” asked respondents to take into account severity, outlining amounts of debris generate and the types of debris involved. Respondents were asked to describe their methods, including response times, price, and the cost for them to provide the initial 72 hour push.

The City received fifteen proposals for RFP 09-007. Proposals were received and levels of responsiveness varied among proposals as outlined in the attached spreadsheet. Some proposals were deemed incomplete and this was reflected in their scores. The respondents were as follows:

These fifteen (15) Respondents were ranked on a detailed matrix evaluating many criteria including:

City staff, during a series of advertised public meetings, evaluated the respondents on the above mentioned criteria in addition to several other items. Staff also took into consideration other criteria including proximity of Respondents equipment and resources to Key West. Alternate means of transporting said equipment in the event that we lose connection to the mainland. Taken into consideration were any past auditing/invoicing or FEMA reimbursement issues or past issues with sub-contractors. (Please see attached Excel Workbook titled "RFP 09007 Comparison")

Based on these criteria a scoring system was devised to assign a point value to each of the specific line items. A compilation of these point totals allowed staff to rank the fifteen (15) respondents. This information was collected and entered into the spreadsheet, which was designed to rank the proposals in three categories:

- Combined Score (Best value, adds price and experience together)
- Experience and Resources (Most qualified based on their experience/resources)
- Cost of Services (Cheapest cost for services proposed)

"In order to fulfill its needs, the City intends to retain a contractor under a disaster response services agreement (the "Contract"). The Contract will be for a three-year term for such services as may be required in the event of a natural or man-made disaster. No minimum amount of such services or compensation will be assured to any contractor so retained, and the City shall not be prevented in any manner from retaining other contractors at its sole discretion." (RFP 09-007)

The City of Key West intends to enter into three year contracts with three of the five finalists, with the capabilities of extending said contracts. Once contracts have been established, the City will reserve the right to deal with each of the three providers equally and dependant on availability and performance.

OPTIONS / ADVANTAGES / DISADVANTAGES:

- Reject all proposals and develop a more comprehensive RFP.
This option is not recommended. There were no proposers determined to be "Non-Responsive."
- Reject adopted scoring system and consider other scoring possibilities in the formulation of a short list of Respondents.

This option is not recommended. This scoring system was comprehensive and allowed for all aspects of service and potential service to be considered.
- Accept staff's recommended rankings (Combined Score) of the Proposers; instruct staff to negotiate contracts with five Proposers. Proposers will be negotiated with in the order of ranking, provided by the City Commission, and the City of Key West will enter into contracts with five proposers. The City of Key West reserves the right to task any one or more of the Proposers during any event.
- Based on these criterion, a scoring system was devised to assign a point value to each of the specific line items. A compilation of these point totals allowed staff to rank the fifteen (15) respondents. This information was collected and entered into the spreadsheet, which was designed to rank the proposals in three categories:

- Combined Score (Best value, adds price and experience together)


- Experience and Resources (Most qualified based on their experience/resources)
- Cost of Services (Cheapest cost for services proposed)

FINANCIAL IMPACT:

This item has no current financial impact. In the event of a storm event and the services of the secondary debris contractor were needed, typically the City would pay 12.5% of the total cost of services if a declaration of emergency was signed by the Governor of Florida. The rest of the cost of services would be reimbursed by FEMA at 75% and the state of Florida at 12.5%. There is a large difference between the lowest service cost proposed and the most expensive. The highest cost proposal is more than two times the cost of the lowest cost proposal.

RECOMMENDATION:

Staff recommends approval of the Resolution ranking the 5 firms.
